2018 Complete Streets Letter of Intent Due March 8th

The Monadnock Alliance for Sustainable Transportation invites interested municipalities to submit a letter of intent for the Monadnock Region Complete Streets Implementation Grant by Thursday, March 8th. Up to \$95,000 is available for projects that enhance safety and mobility for users of all ages, abilities, and modes of travel. To be eligible for this opportunity, applicants must be a municipality located in the SWRPC planning region and have an adopted Complete Streets policy in place at the time of application submittal. Road Surface Management

SWRPC is currently seeking municipalities that are interested in technical assistance with regard to road surface management. The assistance involves implementing data collection and software tools to develop a ten-year pavement maintenance plan. SWRPC will collect data about existing road surface conditions and work with the town highway/public works department or road agent to explore different maintenance, rehabilitation or repair scenarios for individual roads. Letters of interest are currently being accepted for this service. Tri-State Coordination

SWRPC staff has been a participant in meetings with Windham Regional Commission in Vermont and Franklin County Council of Governments in Massachusetts. During 2016, a study was conducted comparing the Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) documents from the three regions. Following the CEDS comparison study, the three partners continued meeting and identified other potential topics that would benefit from inter-regional coordination. One of those ideas is to review opportunities for improving transportation connections between the three regions. The agencies have formed a Tri-State Mobility Connections Committee that has been meeting to identify opportunities for collaboration, share information, and examine interregional commuting patterns. B. provided socioeconomic data about the transportation needs of vulnerable populations living in the area based on research conducted for the Monadnock Region Coordinating Council for Community Transportation's *Coordinated Community Transportation Plan*.
